2024 Cascadia Innovation Corridor Conference Unveils New Ideas for Mega-Regional Strategy to Supercharge Housing Construction and Address Affordability Crisis

Oregon, Washington, and British Columbia leaders unveil strategy to build 1.4 million new homes across Cascadia

PORTLAND, OR. – Nov. 18, 2024 – US and Canadian leaders spanning business, government, not-for-profit organizations, and academia will convene for the 7th annual Cascadia Innovation Corridor (CIC) Conference tackling the housing crisis and delivering new ideas for a mega-regional strategy that could create about 1.4 million new homes.

Across Oregon, Washington, and British Columbia, affordable homes are out of reach for too many families. The Cascadia megaregion is bringing this critical issue to the forefront. Estimates show the need for 3 million new housing units over the next twenty years to meet the current deficit and address anticipated demand driven by population growth. This number far exceeds historical building rates and represents a projected shortfall of approximately 1 million homes.

With the support of the CIC's public-private partners, this year's conference will introduce ambitious comprehensive statewide and provincial ideas aimed at breaking the logjams that have hindered housing construction for decades. Ideas include rezoning underutilized commercial corridors to unlock developable land for millions of new housing units, permitting reform, innovation in construction methods and technology, and a range of policies to lower the cost of housing.

The conference will feature two new reports that offer solutions to address our housing crisis and incentivize development, remove barriers, and encourage bold action to build more housing, especially for our region's middle-income workers such as nurses, teachers, construction workers, and firefighters.

Two reports – "Build, Baby, Build: Unlocking 1.4 Million New Homes in Cascadia" released by the Cascadia Innovation Corridor and "A Grand Boulevard Housing Solution for Cascadia" by HDR Calthorpe – outline recommended next steps state, provincial, and regional leaders can take to address the housing deficit, including a comprehensive approach that could result in about 1.4 million new housing units, with the potential to unlock additional capacity.

This year's CIC conference features speakers who will focus on the investments made, lessons learned, and new strategies to dramatically increase housing supply.

 Microsoft President and Vice Chair Brad Smith will give a keynote address on lessons learned from Microsoft's housing investments.

- **Gov. Tina Kotek** of Oregon will highlight Oregon's work and ideas to increase housing supply.
- Urban Designer Peter Calthorpe will discuss HDR's recent analysis of Cascadia's commercial corridors and transformative reforms to substantially increase construction of residential and mixed-use housing.
- California Assemblymember **Buffy Wicks** will highlight the impact of recent statewide legislation in California to jump-start housing production.
- Washington state **Lt. Gov. Denny Heck** and **Andrea Bell**, Executive Director of Oregon Housing and Community Services, will discuss how the government can meet the scale of the problem.

Since 2016, the Cascadia Innovation Corridor has advanced forward-looking initiatives for the benefit of the almost 10 million people living in the Cascadia mega-region. These projects have addressed both the challenges this region faces, including climate change and transportation mobility, and the opportunities, such as regional collaboration on cancer research, ultra-high speed rail, and decarbonization of aviation fuels at our three largest commercial airports. The 2024 conference continues the collective work to build a thriving mega-region.

Following the conference, there will also be convening of business, civic, and government leaders from across Cascadia as leaders continue to work to bring high speed rail to the region.

With a comprehensive approach across Cascadia, we can unlock a key strategy – Grand Boulevards – to develop 1.4 million units of housing near jobs, services, and transit."
